Call for Whitney High School to Support and Protect its Black Students

June 14, 2020

To Principal John Briquelet, Superintendent Dr. Mary Sieu, Dr. Rios, Dr. Wise, Whitney High School Administration, and ABCUSD Board Members:

This letter is written under the leadership of Black alumni with the full support of alumni and current students of Whitney High School, who wish to address the endemic racism and anti-Black sentiments rampant within the Whitney community. As authors, reviewers, and signatories, we reflect upon and follow the ongoing leadership of Black students in shedding light on their horrific experiences while attending Whitney School. The recent tragedies of Black men and women being unjustly murdered coupled with the chilling accounts of multiple generations of Black students make it exceedingly clear there is extensive work to be done, both as a nation and as a community.

It is wholly insufficient and unsatisfactory to give a cursory acknowledgement of the injustice and oppression your Black students have been systemically subjected to; Whitney High School is directly responsible and has done a grave disservice to its Black students by consistently failing to support and protect them. Whitney High School must own, condemn, and radically commit itself to the remedy and eradication of the evil it has perpetuated through immediate and actionable means. We demand accountability on the part of Whitney High School administration and faculty for their racism and hate toward Black students, which has resulted in generations of pain and trauma, as well as an unsafe environment obstructive to learning and development for Black students. We must work to bring about tangible change for eradicating racially motivated discrimination and hostility, and to advocate for the improvement of the comprehensive experience of Black students at Whitney.

It is no secret that racism permeates social institutions, and this is especially true within education. Teachers, students, and the educational system as a whole perpetuate implicit and explicit racism by means of ignorance of the conditions affecting Black students, schoolwide exclusionary practices, and failure to protect students from racial discrimination and aggressions. Psychologists have emphasized the importance of school as a factor for social and ethnic identity development, especially during adolescent years, when moral reasoning is still

developing.¹ Educators have detailed how students are able to enjoy school and learn better when they feel empowered, accepted, and safe.² By failing to create and maintain that environment for each individual student, the quality of their educational experience is being compromised. Education is a tool for upward mobility and serves as a formative social space for our future leaders; yet, the education system is often another touchpoint of systemic racism that Black individuals must overcome, or risk suffering the consequences of stunted personal growth.³

Whitney High School cannot claim to be an "outstanding academic institution"⁴ when it is historically complicit in the perpetuation of bigotry and racism against its own students. We demand that Whitney High School take accountability for its failure to protect and support its Black community and to radically commit itself to change. Furthermore, we challenge Whitney High School to live up to its espoused values and set an example for peer institutions to follow by taking an emphatic public stance against racism and laboring to create an environment conducive to the learning and development of all students, especially the marginalized Black community.

With this in mind, we demand the Whitney High School administration take the following actions:

1. Designate explicit sanctions and protocol within an enforced 'zero-tolerance' policy in the Whitney Student Handbook for racial aggression, discrimination, etc.

The current handbook states, "Whitney High School promotes a positive learning environment. Harassment or threats of any kind related to gender, or religious/ethnic/cultural background will not be tolerated. Sexual comments, innuendoes, or slurs, oral or in writing, regarding a person's sexual orientation will be treated as sexual harassment. Anyone who becomes a victim, no matter how minor, is asked to report it immediately to an adult on campus."⁵ Within this action, we demand:

a. An explicit inclusion of a zero-tolerance policy for racial abuse, attacks, and racial discrimination at all levels, as well as a course of action for sanctions.

b. A new disciplinary policy should be included in the student handbook that clearly delineates consequences students would face for racial transgressions.

2. Implement a Bias Incident Reporting process with a designated Black equity advisor, counselor, or interventionist.

- a. When a student reports a bias incident, designated administrators should receive a full account of the incident, support the afflicted student, connect them with the appropriate resources, address the staff member or other student involved in the incident, escalate the issue if necessary, and follow up with both parties until the situation has been resolved.
- b. The designated advisor should be a specialist in adolescent psychology with a focus on racial issues. This position should be filled by a Black professional, ideally a woman.
- c. This reporting process would help students feel safe and supported when a racially motivated incident has taken place. Due to the power dynamic between teacher and student, students feel unsafe and in danger of retaliation directly addressing an incident when it happens. With a proper third party process in place, students can feel safe and the situation can be resolved effectively.

3. Diversify the current curriculum by integrating and highlighting Black historical success and figures.

- a. Integrate modern, Black, Women, Queer, and Indigenous diasporic intersections of authors into the English curriculum. The English literary canon typically contains the work of white men with privileged and dated ideologies. It is important to enrich the texts with which students engage in order to promote the diversity of thought conducive to a more holistic, contextualized, and contemporary perspective for both students and teachers. Cited below is a list of social justice reading materials by grade level, drawn from recommendations by State and National Teachers of the Year⁶.
- b. Highlight Black mathematicians, chemists, physicists, et cetera, in the courses to which they correspond and *credit them for their contributions*. Many influential Black innovators are underappreciated for their contributions to world-changing inventions, interventions, and discoveries. Therefore, highlighting their work can serve as a simple method to amplify underrepresented narratives in a just way.
- c. Integrate more accurate teaching modules in history units that cover Black history and Black people. The current history curriculum portrays a biased depiction of history in the name of 'objectivity'--a white-centered curriculum is not objective. Accurate teaching of Black history should be infused in the curriculum year-round, not just during Black History Month, and not just during units that cover the Atlantic slave trade.

d. Allocate Black history and legacy units throughout any forthcoming Ethnic Studies curriculum.

4. Integrate multi-level Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging⁷ education into the 7-12 grade level curricula.

Whitney's current vision statement states, "Whitney High School strives to develop intrinsically motivated, collaborative learners who approach their education purposefully and creatively by taking ownership of their learning to become responsible, innovative global citizens."⁸ What kind of global citizens are you developing, when many of your students harbor hate and discrimination against their fellow citizens? Within this action, we demand that Whitney High School:

- a. Educates students on how racism has shaped and is built into the foundation of American society, leading to the many racial inequities and obstacles widely faced by Black Americans today. This education should involve in-depth study and critical examination of the United States' long history of racial discrimination, oppression, and disenfranchisement, as well as the supressed narratives of marginalized groups. Further, it should define systemic and institutional racism, as well as highlight the racism inherent in education, health care, employment, government, the judicial system, and law enforcement.
- b. Invests in social justice education in order to develop comprehensive training that addresses anti-Black implicit bias, while propelling students into advocacy and creating a more inclusive community. As a goal, the curriculum should:
 - i. Provide the opportunity for students to engage with concepts such as identity, power and privilege, and cultural competency through interactive and mandatory coursework. Similar to the training proposed for teachers, the social justice education curriculum should foster greater overall awareness of the various cultural differences and lived experiences across diverse communities.
 - ii. Foster discussions surrounding the real consequences of racism and how damaging they are for Black peoples', and particularly Black students' psychological, emotional, and physical safety and well-being.
 - iii. Teach strategies for rejecting and unlearning the racial hierarchies that have been ingrained in our society via toxic societal conditioning to students.
 - iv. Help students understand how oppression is perpetuated through derogatory slurs pertaining to racism, ableism, sexism, homophobia, et cetera. Lessons should make explicitly clear that despite how harmless they seem, such statements have the potential to negatively impact other

students and contribute to a larger system of racial hierarchy and oppression.

- v. Encourage the use of strategies that students can practically and routinely employ as a way to sustain long-term accountability within the student body. Emphasize that accountability is important and that it must first start within ourselves, our families, Whitney High School, and the greater Cerritos community.
- vi. Be similar or exceeding in caliber to race and racism curricula offered at peer institutions.⁹ ¹⁰
- c. Requires that leaders of student organizations, sports teams, and other extracurricular activities successfully complete an additional Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging training module with a specific focus on leadership and mediation in order to serve well in their positions.
- d. Enriches the cultural experience of Whitney through leadership and education programming and provides opportunities for community engagement and identity expression. Whitney should continue to intentionally build educational programming and advocacy into these events to serve as a supplement to the curriculum.
- e. Integrates the proposed curriculum as a mandatory part of the 7th grade elective wheel and continues to build upon the curriculum in succeeding years during dedicated units in the English curriculum.
- f. Provide proper facilitation training to teachers so they can effectively teach the social justice education curriculum proposed in this section.

5. Require extensive, ongoing, and long-term diversity, inclusion, and social justice training for faculty and staff.

- a. Faculty and staff should engage in professional development that includes cultural sensitivity training every year in order to bridge cultural and ideological differences to best serve their students and create a positive environment that is conducive to the learning of all students.
- b. Faculty and staff have the power to either encourage or inhibit hatred and harm towards Black students. In their training, it is imperative that they acknowledge and address their own implicit and explicit biases in order to serve as better educators. Fostering and managing a culturally responsive classroom allows for all students to achieve more equitable opportunities and exist with a sense of belonging. Recognizing one's own cultural biases and learning about students' cultural backgrounds are just some of the essential steps to be taken towards a safer learning environment.¹¹
- c. Bystander Intervention training should be implemented for educating teachers and staff as to how to intervene in situations in which they witness racially

motivated attacks on students. Most institutions of higher learning and employers require students and employees to complete trainings such as these, with sexual harassment and gender-based discrimination as the focus. Similar strategies and modules can be applied to racial harassment and race-based discrimination.

- d. Resources that Whitney High School administration might find useful for fulfilling this endeavor have been provided at the end of this letter, including:
 - i. an example of a training module currently in use by another respectable learning institution,¹²
 - ii. a training outline to guide future interventions at Whitney,¹³
 - iii. research supporting the utility of such trainings and further recommendations for implementation¹⁴
- e. Programs such as *Teaching Tolerance*¹⁵ and *Edutopia*¹⁶ provide free resources to educators—teachers, administrators, counselors, and other practitioners—who work with children from kindergarten through high school. Educators should use these materials to supplement the curriculum, inform their practices, and create civil and inclusive school communities where children are respected, valued, and welcomed participants.

6. Issue a public stand against racism and commitment to change from Whitney High School administration and an announcement of ways to move forward.

- a. This public statement should address Whitney's past and present racial misconduct.
- b. This public statement should hold Whitney accountable for its actions and future commitments to combat racial injustice moving forward.
- c. This public statement should vocally and unequivocally denounce anti-Blackness at Whitney and express support explicitly for Black students who have bravely shared their traumatic experiences.

7. Listen to the Black community all of the time, not just in times of crisis.

Whitney's lack of actionable response in the past several years speaks to the continued disconnect between administrators and student experiences. There must be serious reflection and understanding of how anti-Black events and responses on campus have been harmful to Black students. Within this action, we demand that Whitney High School:

a. Own its traumatic impact on Black students. Good intentions do not negate the harmful impact that they may have on an individual. The institution must hold

itself accountable for how Black students have felt at Whitney, despite the intentions it may have had.

b. Involve, consult, and collaborate with the Whitney High School Black Alumni Association and Black Parent Association in future Whitney events, and especially in decisions affecting the Black student body.

CLOSING THOUGHTS

The value of supporting Black students cannot be overemphasized in the face of the present circumstances. This support includes not only listening to Black students, *but also trusting that we are the best sources of consultation for our own needs.*

These demands and proposed actions are meant to provide Principal Briquelet and other Whitney High School administrators the opportunity to honor their pledge to take appropriate action to dismantle the systems that uphold and promote anti-Blackness in the educational space. To not take any immediate action that will create and sustain long-term change and accountability will communicate that Whitney High School does not care about its Black students, parents, faculty, and staff. This will effectively demonstrate that this institution is complacent in allowing the unnecessary trauma and pain that current and former Black students have had to endure in order to receive an education they rightfully deserved.

It is imperative that Whitney takes this opportunity to hear us, see us, and take these actionable steps to transform the persistent toxic, anti-Black, racist culture that exists. We are not satiated by the delicate words offered in Principal Briquelet's June 4th letter.¹⁷ We need more than attentive listening. We need active listening. We hope that all those in positions of power to change Whitney High School will move beyond words and into accountability and galvanized action.
